

Territorial Acknowledgment

The land on which we gather is the traditional territory of the Wendat, the Anishinabek Nation, the Haudenosaunee Confederacy, the Mississaugas of Scugog, Hiawatha and Alderville First Nations and the Métis Nation. This territory was the subject of the Dish With One Spoon Wampum Belt Covenant, an agreement between the Iroquois Confederacy and the Ojibwe and allied nations to peaceably share and care for the resources around the Great Lakes. The treaties that were signed for this particular parcel of land are collectively referred to as the Williams Treaties of 1923. We offer our gratitude to the First Peoples for their care for, and teachings about, our earth and our relations. We honour those teachings and commit ourselves to living peaceably together in a spirit of respect and reconciliation.

God exalted him at his right hand as Leader and Saviour that he might give repentance to Israel and forgiveness of sins. And we are witnesses to these things, and so is the Holy Spirit whom God has given to those who obey him."

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe." A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

Then at the conclusion of the Gospel, the reader says,

The Gospel of Christ. People: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Homily

Celebrant Let us confess our faith, as we say,

All We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshipped and glorified. He has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, a death he freely accepted, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: this is my body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore, Father, according to his command,

In the fullness of time, reconcile all things in Christ, and make them new, and bring us to that city of light where you dwell with all your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation; by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, almighty Father, now and for ever. **Amen.**

Homily for the Second Sunday of Easter - Shane Watson, Lay Reader

Last week at the end of the Gospel reading, Mary, after discovering the empty tomb and encountering Jesus in the garden, ran to tell the disciples that their Lord is risen! What good news!

Today we pick up from right where we left off last week. It is the same day. Mary discovered the empty tomb in the morning, and it is now evening. There must be a big celebration happening –like we celebrated last Sunday, right? Not quite.

That very evening of the day that Mary tells the disciples about her encounter with Jesus, the disciples are in the house; the doors are locked, and they are afraid. Wouldn't we be afraid also? The temple leadership in collaboration with the Romans have had Jesus crucified —he is dead, and they have been left feeling alone. Can what Mary told them be true? Even if it is, are they next to be suspended from the cross anyway? Fear may not be a strong enough description for their feelings.

In their fear, in the locked house, Jesus appears to them. He stands with them and says, "Peace be with you." He shows them his wounds —and they rejoice. There is no mistaking what has happened. This encounter with Jesus is what they needed. In their joy and excitement, Jesus says to them a second time, "Peace be with you." But one of the disciples is missing. Thomas is not with them. Perhaps he was in hiding elsewhere. Maybe he was less afraid than the others and was finding out what was going on 'out there'.

The scene when Thomas sees the others is easy to imagine, isn't it? Have you ever stepped into a situation where as soon as you arrived everyone is telling you all at once about something exciting that happened that day? Perhaps a toddler in your life took their first steps. What is your reaction? Happiness and excitement for sure –but don't you also want to see it for yourself and

have a memory of your very own? It's not that you don't' believe what anyone has told you is a fact -but you haven't experienced it.

I think Thomas' reaction to the others telling him about their encounter with Jesus is something like that. "Thomas! You just missed it! Jesus was here and he's alive and we saw his wounds and everything!" Thomas' reply to this account from the others is how I can image we might feel in that situation. Perhaps he's wondering why his beloved Lord wouldn't have appeared to him also. Thomas doesn't respond with something like, "You are all hallucinating. Jesus is dead. He's not coming back, and we all need to get on with things." No —he doesn't say that. His friends have had this encounter with Jesus, and he too wants that experience. He wants to see. He wants to see it and experience it and feel it the same way the other disciples have. He's been told his Lord is alive and he's thirsty for the same depth of belief that the encounter with Jesus has produced in the others.

What happens next, doesn't happen right away. What must have felt like a one very long week later, the disciples are again gathered in the house –including Thomas. Through the closed doors Jesus appears. Whatever state of emotional turmoil they are in, Jesus says to them a third time, "Peace be with you." He next turns to Thomas, and without rebuking Thomas, or calling him a doubter, or scolding him for not being with the others last week, Jesus simply invites Thomas to see his wounds and to touch them so that Thomas can experience the gift of this encounter.

Thomas' response should put away any mislabeling of him as a doubter. No greater expression of belief will you find from a disciple than his exclamation, "My Lord and my God!" Thomas has been thirsty for his Lord. He's heard about the encounter that the others have had, and he wants to experience it also –and now he has. Jesus came for Thomas; and that is good news for you and me.

In my life, if I have twelve people to meet with and I am able get eleven of them together at the same time, that's pretty good. That last person, I'm sorry to say, will have to get caught out up later. We'll share meeting minutes or have someone relay what happened. But that alone is not good enough for Thomas and it's not good enough for Jesus. Thomas expresses what he's thirsty for, and Jesus responds. He gives Thomas the same gift of encounter he gave the others.

The point of Jesus showing himself to the disciples is not to merely prove that resurrection is possible, as if a fact that is good enough to know intellectually. He gives the disciples more. He gives them a transformative experience. Then he sends them out from the closed doors of the house, equipped with this rich experience and the Holy Spirit; to share this thirst for abundant life in Christ.

Just as Jesus comes for Thomas, our risen Lord will come for each one of us; not only if we believe with an unshakable and rock-solid faith (though blessed are you if you have that) but he comes in our thirst for that kind of faith. Like the father in one of the healings in the Gospel of Mark, we may proclaim, "I believe, help my unbelief." (Mark 9:24)

I can't expect you to believe because Thomas believed, or because I believe, or because the other disciples did, or because dozens in our midst do. Maybe that isn't good enough anyway. I pray that we each thirst for the sort of faith that Thomas displays in his encounter with our Lord.

It is good news that our Lord and our God will come for each one of us in our need if we will only be open to that and ask for life in the name of Christ Jesus, our risen Lord.

Amen.

Hallelujah.
